	RECOMMENDED FY 2020 MATCH ALLOCATIONS

The DAWG met via teleconference on September 12, 2019 26, 2018. The participating DAWG members were Tom Daniel (Boundary SCD), Steve Becker (Nez Perce SWCD), Julie Burkhardt (Adams SWCD), Jennifer Jenson (Bear Lake SWCD,) and ISWCC Commissioner Eric Olson. Staff appreciate the commitment of the DAWG members to helping us accomplish this important work. All District Financial and Match Reports had been sent to the DAWG on flash drives prior to the meeting.

District Match Recommendations developed by SWCC staff and DAWG members are attached (attachment 5a-1, District Match Eligibility Recommendations). The following District reports are of note:

- Bruneau River SWCD failed to submit a complete Financial & Match Report. District staff simply did not have time to complete the report, and the district stated that because they are in a good financial position, other Districts probably needed their share of State match funds more than they do.
- Clearwater received significant funding in 2019 but because they didn't deposit the funds into their bank account until after the close of FY2019 they are not eligible for FY2020 match. Those funds will be eligible to receive match in FY2021.
- Franklin District's donation from Water District 13A was discussed. During the meeting SWCC staff did not have with them the documentation upon which they based their determination that the donation was ineligible for match. DAWG members considered the documents which were available to them and recommended the WD13A funds be considered as eligible for match. Staff have provided additional documentation for your consideration (Attachment 5a-3, Explanation for SWCC Staff Determination That WD13A Funds Ineligible for Match)

The final staff recommendation on match eligibility of local support received by Districts in FY2019 is attached (attachment 5a-2, Staff's Final District Match Eligibility Recommendation). After accounting for the 5% holdback of Trustee and Benefit funds and the \$575,000 that was distributed to Districts in July, \$615,540 remains to be distributed as District Match Allocations. Assuming that you approve staff's final recommendation on match eligibility, the recommended match allocation for each District is as presented in attachment 5a-7, Recommended District Match Allocations.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve the recommended FY 2020 District Allocation Matching Funds as shown in Attachment 5a-7, for immediate disbursement.

Explanation for SWCC Staff Determination That WD13A Funds Ineligible for Match

A November 7, 2018 letter from the Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR) to Franklin Soil and Water Conservation District (FSWCD) addresses the 2018 donation FSWCD received from Water District 13-A (WD13A). Because the facts presented by IDWR in their 2018 letter are applicable to WD13-A's 2019 donation, the pertinent part of that letter is excerpted below.

"WD13A Donations to the FSWCD and Disbursement of WD13A Funds

The Department recently received a copy of a letter dated August 8, 2018 documenting a donation from WD13A to the FSWCD in the amount of \$5,500 for 'General Support'. The document was signed by Brian Jensen acting as the WD13A President. The same document includes an attached copy of a check from WD13A to the FSWCD in the amount of \$5,500 for general support, signed by Brian Jensen and Maxine Waddoups.

The WD13A 2018 adopted budget on file with the Department did not include an authorization to provide a \$5,500 "donation" to FSWCD. The Department understands that the WD13A budget did include \$3,500 for cloud seeding and \$2,000 for river measuring. The Department understands that the FSWCD provides certain river measuring tasks for WD13A. The Department also understands that the FSWCD facilitates cloud seeding for WD13A, possibly in cooperation with other agencies and entities. The \$5,500 "donation" to FSWCD raises three issues.

First, Idaho Code § 42-612(1) requires that expenditures of a water district be related to "delivering the water" to the water users. Water district "donations" are not authorized by statute. Cloud seeding and river measurements are valid water district expenses recognized by Idaho Code § 42-605. If WD13A is actually providing payment to FSWCD for cloud seeding and river measuring, the Department questions whether it is appropriate to characterize the payment as a "donation." In the future, the Department recommends that WD13A avoid characterizing payments to FSWCD for cloud seeding and river measuring as "donation."

In 2019 WD13A again provided FSWCD with \$5,500, along with a letter of support signed by WD13A advisory committee member Lyle Porter stating the funds were not provided for special projects but adding that they were "to benefit Water Quantity" (see attachment 5a-4, FSWCD Match Funding Worksheet). As in 2018, the 2019 WD13A budget doesn't include a \$5,500 donation but it does include \$3,500 for cloud seeding and \$2,000 for river measuring (see attachment 5a-5, WD13A 2019 Budget). Like IDWR, SWCC understands that FSWCD performs certain river measuring services for WD13A and facilitates the water district's cloud seeding program, suggesting that the \$5,500 "donation" is actually payment from WD13A to FSWCD for services related to river measuring and cloud seeding.

September 11, 2019, FSWCD sent DAWG members a letter intended to "clarify why we feel the donation we received from Water District 13A (WD13A) meets Idaho code requirements" and should be eligible to receive State match (see attachment 5a-6, September 2019 Letter from FSWCD). In their letter, FSWCD states that WD13A approved a donation of \$5,500 which was

issued to FSWCD in May, 2019. However, the budget approved by WD13A (attachment 5a-5) does not include a \$5,500 donation, and even if it did such a donation is not authorized by statute, as IDWR pointed out in their letter to WD13A, excerpted above.

Based on the above, SWCC staff recommend that the \$5,500 that FSWCD received from WD13A be deemed ineligible to receive State match.

Dear Idaho DAWG Committee Members,

I am submitting this correspondence on behalf of the Franklin County Soil and Water Conservation District (FCSWCD) board of supervisors with the intent to clarify why we feel the donation we received from Water District 13A (WD13A) meets Idaho code requirements. On September 5th, 2019 our district received notice via e-mail from Idaho Soil and Water Conservation Commission (ISWCC) staff that they were recommending that the donation we received from WD13A not be allowed as match. Their listed rational for not allowing this item is it is project specific. After requests to ISWCC staff for clarification as to the rational for denial by ISWCC have been left unanswered with no response, I will communicate the criteria FCSWCD supervisors used to determine that the donation is allowable.

On March 4th, 2019 FCSWCD attended WD13A's annual meeting and asked for the continued support of our district's efforts through a monetary donation. Water District 13A approved a donation of \$5,500 as was customary in previous years. A check in the amount of \$5,500 was issued to FCSWCD on May 21st, 2019. This check was deposited into FCSWCD's "general fund" bank account. Water District 13A did not place any restrictions as to how their donation be spent.

These dollars are not tied to any contract, deliverables, promises, or fee for service. These dollars are used for projects and activities that FCSWCD supervisors deem appropriate and align with our mission statement.

This donation also aligns with the allowable match guidelines and recommendations that were given to us by our Idaho State licensed auditor.

I appreciate this opportunity to clarify why this item was submitted for match and would welcome any further questions or discussion regarding this or other match items. Please do not hesitate to contact me or any other FCSWCD supervisor directly.

- Conducted project tour for DFM, LSO, DHR, Governor's Office
- Submitted FY 2020 Budget Request
- Chairman Wright attended Power and Portneuf District meetings and Delwyne Trefz attended Power, Oneida, Caribou, and Bear Lake District meetings
- Attended Idaho Environmental Forum (BLM Headquarters moving to Colorado?)
- Participated in teleconference meeting for Center for Collaborative Conservation, reviewed charter draft
- Attended Curtis Elke's quarterly federal and state agency Partnership Breakfast
- Prepared briefing material for Governor in preparation for Capitol for the Day in Rathdrum (see attached). The Kootenai Shoshone's 5 Year Plan was used to develop the issues discussed. Bill Lillibridge, Brad Shelton, and Todd Higens attended to answer any questions.

FY 2020 Budget Holdback

We received the attached memo from the Governor's Office on September 9th about a new process for agencies to holdback a percentage of the General Fund budget as a contingency reserve in case revenues fail to meet projections. According to the memo, it is possible that so doing will be a regular practice in the coming years. Dedicated and federal funds are not included in the mandatory holdback.

Staff is preparing a plan to include 5% holdbacks of Commission appropriations in FY 2020 in Personnel, Operating, Capital, and Trustee and Benefit funds (district funding is also subject to the holdback). We anticipate that it will be necessary to holdback around \$62,000 of the remaining \$678.200 in Trustee and Benefits in proportion to the local match amounts reported by each district. We have been advised that we may expect the holdback to continue into June 2020.

In case the economy worsens, and it should be necessary to revert the 5% to the General Fund, the plan immediately implements a 5% reduction in our current year's budget to enable the Commission to continue operating through the full fiscal year.

ISSUES

Soil Erosion Varies by land use, types of soil, management practices and other factors. Generally soil erosion on the steeper dry cropland fields can exceed 12 tons/acre/year of no conservation practices are used. If Best Management Practices are implemented, erosion can be reduced to less than 3 tons/acre/year. The naturally recharged sole source aquifer, the Rathdrum Prairie does not erode at excessive rates due to the nature of the soils and flat slopes.

Water Resources Non-point sources affect approximately 72% of the total number of stream segments in the Panhandle hydrologic basin while approximately 2% of the total segments are affected by point sources such as municipal and industrial wastewater treatment plants. Water quality of rivers and streams in the basin is primarily affected by sediment, nutrients, and bacteria with heavy metal toxicity observed in the Coeur d'Alene River Basin. Beneficial use impairment ranges from none, on some stream segments, to cold water and salmonid spawning only on other stream segments, and impairment of all beneficial uses on other segments in the basin.

Surface Water Quality Many of the streams and lakes within the District are impaired. Surface waters are inundated with sediment flow during the spring runoff and usually clear up by midsummer, unless isolated thunderstorms on unprotected land contribute sediment to the streams.

Ground Water Quality The Rathdrum Prairie Aquifer provides groundwater. The primary use of ground water is for human and domestic consumption as well as irrigation. Rural residents use numerous shallow spring developments for potable water. Animal wastes, fertilizers and pesticides may contaminate some of these springs. Others have low flows during dry years. A better quality and more consistent quantity of water are found in the ground and it is expected that more wells will be drilled. Over the last several years there has been a rapid growth of housing developments on the Rathdrum Prairie. Several farmers have sold their land to these developers due to difficulties associated with the Crop Residue Burning program. Building on top of the Sole Source Aquifer is a major concern.

Animal Waste Management At present, within the District there are a total of 5 confined livestock operations, a hog operation and a few small dairy operations. These operations are not located near water sources and are not at this time felt to be a critical resource problem.

Land Use Kootenai County is experiencing rapid urban growth. The county population is in excess of 157,000 people. Urban development in Kootenai County occurs between Spokane and Post Falls (the southern edge of the Rathdrum Prairie). It also occurs on the Rathdrum Prairie, primarily agricultural land. Much of it is prime farmland (if irrigated). The land is flat and has few limitations for building site development. There are two concerns related to building on the Rathdrum Prairie: what affect development may have on water quality of the Rathdrum aquifer, and loss of agricultural land and the livelihood of farmers.

A third area of the county experiencing urban type growth is around the lakes. Some homes do not have adequate septic systems. Other areas are currently experiencing rapid development such as Hayden Lake. Concerns include water quality impacts to the lakes from erosion and other man induced causes. Also of concern is exceeding the carrying capacity of the lakes with over-development. There is an obvious, critical need for wise urban development. Controls are needed in regard to use of septic systems, especially over the aquifer and near water bodies.

SUBJECT: FY 2020 Budget Planning

Thanks to each of you for the timely submission of your FY 2021 budget requests. We are beginning to review each budget submission in detail, and we will be in touch with any questions that arise as Governor Little prepares his executive budget recommendation.

Idaho is still in the top ten states for revenue growth, but due to continuing uncertainty about the economic forecast nationally, we want to ensure Idaho is well-positioned for any potential revenue scenario.

The Governor intends to launch a new process whereby agencies identify a certain percentage of their budgets to hold in reserve should the actual General Fund revenues come in below the current revised forecast. Planning and preparation now will preclude us from the very disruptive consequence of a late-year holdback, if revenues fall shorter than forecasted. The approach is consistent with the Governor's "don't spend money until it's in the bank" philosophy, and it will strengthen Idaho's position to deal with future uncertainty. Looking forward, similar contingency plans may become standard in the process of state budgeting.

For the current fiscal year, all agencies (excluding K-12 schools) are directed to put together a plan to hold five-percent of their current FY 2020 General Fund appropriation as a contingency. We will keep you informed in case any contingency plans need to be implemented. Agencies are not being requested to put together a plan for dedicated or federal fund sources.

We are not requesting a report or written summary of your contingency plan, but please be prepared to discuss your plan with your contact in the Governor's Office or your DFM analyst by the week of September 30.

As always, agencies should continue their efforts to ensure Idaho state government is being as efficient as possible with the resources available.

Thank you, as always, for your service to Idaho as leaders within Governor Little's administration.

Idaho Soil and Water Conservation Commission (ISWCC) was initially created in 1939 under Idaho Code § 22-2716, et. seq.) to form local conservation districts. Statute established ISWCC and conservation districts as *"the primary entities to provide assistance to private landowners in the conservation, sustainment, improvement, and enhancement of Idaho's natural resources."* It's now the lead agency for a number of voluntary conservation programs addressing water quality and other natural resource issues, as well.

The Idaho Water Quality Program for Agriculture (WQPA) is a cost-share program under IC 22-2733 offering financial incentives to protect and enhance water quality and fish and wildlife habitat. WQPA was funded by the state's General Fund between 2000 and 2012. The final projects were completed within several years of that. There were 1,698 individual projects accomplished under the WQPA between 2000 and 2012.

State funds in the amount of \$13,449,070 were distributed over the life of the Program. Partner matching funds are estimated, but unknown due to reporting discrepancies.




